1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The college has its vision as "Enhancing Education for Rural". The mission states the core values of imparting quality education in Humanities, Languages, Commerce and Science with equal opportunities to the rural students. It strives to imbibe Nationalism, Patrotism, Sociolism, Equality, Secularism, Peace and Scientific Attitude for overall personality development of students. The college strictly follows the curriculum designed by the university. For the effective delivery of the curriculum the college asks each member of the staff to prepare the semester plan of individual papers. 11 of the present faculties have contributed in University curriculum development. Our faculty members give suggestions to Board of Studies through various workshops concerning modified curricula. The student's feedback on curricula is conveyed to BOS. The college also runs SRTMU, Nanded Distance Education center and Y.C.M.O.University, Nashik Centre. The college has developed a mechanism for sensitizing its stakeholders on various cross cutting issues like gender equality, human rights and environment etc. four of the present faculties have contributed in University curriculum development of PG courses like History, Public administration and Economics. Through various associations and NGOs. ICT based facilities are adequately used in delivering the curriculum. The college runs skill based certificate course like Tally, Spoken English and Beauty Parlor. Besides these, the college has also started need based optional subjects such as Microbiology, Computer Science, Electronics at B.Sc. to compete in global market and to enhance computer literacy among rural students. The college has also organized University level workshops on CBCS- CGPA pattern Curriculum for B.Com. Third Year and B.Sc. First Year Microbiology. The faculty members from different affiliated colleges participated in the workshop was benefited. The college has faculty wise academic coordination committees through which semester wise, subject wise and paper wise teaching plans were prepared and implemented. The monitoring of the teaching plan has been discussed in monthly meeting. The reviews and suggestions were communicated to the concern faculty members. The continuous evaluation programme on the subject wise curriculum has been discussed in the meeting and accordingly it is implemented.

Feedback Obtained

Students play a critical part in the evaluation, development and enhancement of the quality of this learning experience. Feedback from students allows the college to evaluate how its service provision is viewed by its most important group of stakeholders. 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Today's the role of teacher has changed from a teacher to a facilitator. As an institute we provide mentoring and take initiatives to mould the character of the students by facilitating them to overcome various issues such as their academic, nonacademic, emotional and minor economic problems. Most of the students taking admission in our institute are from rural background and many of them are the first generation learners. Due to their socioeconomic environment, these students face the problems of social phobia and inferiority complex which prevent them from being confident and versatile. At the institutional level, we implement student mentoring system. There we counsel and guide every student at an individual level. Mentors are allotted to the students by the UG/PG Class Coordinators. Each teacher is the mentor of about 19 students. All the teachers of the institute take the responsibility of mentorship to make the students free from all phobias and open their minds to grasp and develop new ideas. Mentors collect the personal information of their mentees and guide them on regular basis. Mentees are always free to meet their respective mentors whenever they have any issue or problem. Mentors guide their mentees for their academic progress and maintain their emotional and intellectual quotient. Mentors guide the students for their continual academic progress, career achievements and improve their soft and hard skills. The record of the academic performance of the mentee as well as of personal counseling is properly maintained by the mentor. Through mentoring system we have created student friendly environment in the institution where students feel free to approach their teachers to discuss and share their problems and ideas. Students feel enthusiastic, competent and confident and get motivated for career progression.

2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

As our college is affiliated to Swami Ramanad Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded and it is obligatory for the Affiliating colleges to follow the directives of the university in respect of student's evaluation. As per the university guidelines, we have adopted semester system for undergraduate courses. There are two semesters in every academic year. At the end of each semester the university conducts examinations and declares the results. The college has taken initiatives for the continuous internal evaluation of the students. Bearing in mind the importance of CIE, written and the oral tests are conducted. Two unit tests, seminar, tutorials and home assignments are arranged in the college and end semester examination in each course during each semester is conducted by the university. Teachers make use of ICT for effective teaching learning process. Student seminar is arranged in the class. For this purpose, every student is allotted a topic and he/she prepares a paper with the help of teacher concerned. The time and date is fixed and the students present his paper in the class. Well in advance, the title of the paper and the name of paper presenter are informed. After the presentation of the paper, discussion takes place. The students are given freedom to ask questions to the paper presenter and he/she answers the questions. If the paper presenter fails to answer the question the teacher concerned answers the question. To enhance the knowledge and skills of the students, the teachers can understand the performance of their students in accordance with the objectives they had set before. As per the academic calendar the students' performance is evaluated before the final examination through objective tests, class seminars, group discussion, home assignments, oral test, etc.

IQAC prepares academic calendar at the beginning of the year. It is distributed to the departments at the beginning of new academic session to the teaching and non teaching staff and students of the College for the intimation of yearly schedule. It contains the yearly schedule of the college ranging from holidays to examination to curriculum activities of the college. The academic calendar of the college is prepared in the shade light of the calendar prepared by the parent university for the academic year. It is prepared for the smooth conduct of the activities of the college. The given schedule in the calendar is followed throughout the academic year.
